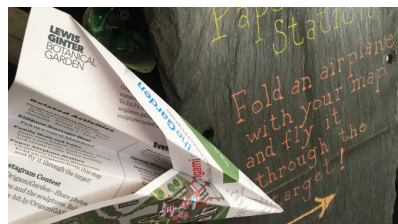

Pick up an origami map at the Admissions Desk and head towards sculpture 3 on the map. The artists who created these sculptures combined symbols that represent their names in the Chinese character on the back of the large pony. Can you think of a time you collaborated with a friend to make something incredible?

Continue your quest to sculpture 4 on the map in the Conservatory. It tells the story of metamorphosis. The transformation from a caterpillar into a butterfly happens inside a protective shell called a chrysalis. Can you pretend to emerge from an imaginary chrysalis and fly to the next sculpture?

Find your way to sculpture 7 on the map. White birds are recognized as a symbol of peace by many people. The birds in this sculpture are cranes, which stay together for life to build nests and raise their chicks. Is there a person, place or thing in your life that represents peace and devotion to you?

Stroll to sculpture 8 on the map. This large animal once thundered across North America grazing heavily on the native grasses of the Great Plains. Notice the small bird, called a cowbird, on the bison's back. The cowbird eats bugs that land on the bison as it stirs them up by moving through grassy meadows.

Next, look for sculpture 9 on the map. "This flock of cranes is lifting off in all directions, symbolizing the spread of peace," said Kevin Box who created this sculpture with Jennifer Box. What makes you feel peaceful? Is there something in nature that you find particularly calming such as a babbling brook or a shady tree?
